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

HENRY COUNTY FAIR RAIN POLICY

If an evening program is canceled due to rain, inclement weather, or for any other reason, before one-half of the program is completed, all paid admission ticket stubs will be honored at any of the evening programs for which an admission is charged.

If the final evening program is canceled due to rain, inclement weather, or for any other reason before one-half of the program is competed, all paid admission stub holders may be entitled to a refund of said admission charge, less \$1.00 (for partial program fee and overhead/administration fees) if said ticket stub holder, within 15 days thereafter, mail said ticket stub to the fair secretary, P.O. Box 862, Mt. Pleasant, IA 52641, and encloses a stamped self-addressed envelope. Failure to enclose ticket stub, or self-addressed envelope or to mail within 15 days after the event shall cancel this refund privilege.

The right to cancel any program and the determination as to whether one-half of said program has been completed rests in the sole discretion of the board of directors of the Henry County Agricultural Association.



A SPECIAL NOTE TO ALL EXHIBITORS & CONCESSIONAIRES

- No alcohol is allowed in livestock barns or exhibit buildings at anytime.
- The department superintendents shall have full control over all the various departments and are responsible for enforcement of their department's rules and regulations
- No premiums will be paid on exhibits removed prior to the release date unless
 the exhibitor has received prior approval from the department committee and the
 executive committee of the Fair Board.
- There shall be no purchase or commitments made in the name of the Henry County Fair without their full consent.
- Any dispute or difference must be settled in a manner satisfactory to the superintendent. If not, it shall be referred to the executive committee of the Fair Board and their decision shall be final

AUCTION RULES

OBJECTIVE OF SHOW & SALE

Financially support 4-H/FFA and encourage the growth and expansion of livestock projects. Train youth in the proper handling, fitting, and showing of livestock. The sale is under the supervision of the Henry County Fair Board.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

To be eligible 4-H and FFA members must conform to the show rules and the following auction rules:

- 1. All exhibitors are expected to wear proper attire for the sale ring, as this is enforced for safety reasons. Suggested attire: hard shoes, long pants, and either a 4-H or FFA shirt.
- 2. Exhibitors will be allowed to sell one entry per species. Only market animals ribbons will be sold (beef, swine, sheep, goat, and broiler) Ribbon sale order for 2025 will be: goat, broiler, swine, beef, & sheep.
- 3. The grand champion and reserve grand champion ribbon winner will sell first in each species. Sale order within species will be determined at random at the time of weigh-in. At the time of weigh-in exhibitors are expected to indicate whether they will participate in the ribbon auction.
- 4. Bidding will be open to the public. All sales will be final. Cash settlement or satisfactory payment arrangements need to be made immediately following the close of the auction. Buyers will pay exhibitors directly.
- Exhibitors must present their own animal in the show ring. 4-H/FFA members 5. will maintain ownership of the animal(s) after the ribbon sale. No animals change hands. Bidders will purchase ribbons earned by members exhibiting their animals at the Henry County Fair. Exhibitors may sell one ribbon per species in which they have participated.
- All persons going through the ribbon auction must be there in person. Those re-6. questing early release or those removing livestock prior to the auction will not be allowed to participate in the ribbon auction. Exhibitors cannot wait until the day of the auction to submit a request. Participation in work or school activities will not be considered. NO EXCEPTIONS.

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4-H & FFA SHOWS

IOWA YOUTH CODE OF ETHICS


4-H and FFA youth are expected to be sincere, honest and act in sportsmanlike ways at all times. Youth represent the entire program and their behavior reflects on their parents, leaders, club and the entire youth program. All adults involved with the youth program, leaders as well as parents, are expected to set positive examples and serve as positive role models by what they say and do. Any youth who breaks the code of ethics or allows another person (adult or peer) to talk them into violating the code of ethics agrees to forfeit all prizes, awards and premiums. The youth may also be prohibited from exhibiting at this and future exhibitions including the Iowa State Fair and other county, state, or regional exhibitions.

GUIDELINES

- Youth will do their own work appropriate for age and physical and mental development. This includes research and writing of exhibit explanations, preparing exhibits (such as sewing, cooking, refinishing, etc.), care and grooming of animals, etc. Adult assistance should help guide and support youth, not do it for them.
- 2. All exhibits will be a true representation of youth's work. Any attempt to take credit for other's work, alter the conformation of animals, or alter their performance is prohibited. Copyright violation or allowing others to complete youth's exhibit is considered misrepresentation and is prohibited.
- 3. Youth will treat all people and animals with respect. Youth will provide appropriate care for animals.
- 4. Youth will present exhibits that are safe for consumption. All food exhibits will be safe for judges to evaluate and for exhibition.
- 5. All food animals that may be harvested immediately following the show shall be safe for consumers, and shall have met all withdrawal times for all medications, and be free of violative drug residue.
- If any animal requires medical treatment while at the fair or exhibition, only the Official Fair Veterinarian may administer the treatment. All medications that are administered shall be done according to the label instructions of the medication used.
- 7. Animals' appearance or performance shall not be altered by any means, including medications, external applications and surgical procedures. Any animal that is found to have its appearance or its performance changed shall be disqualified from the show, and have penalties assessed against the exhibitor, parent and/or guardian by the management of the fair or exhibition.
- 8. Youth will follow all ownership and possession rules and, if requested, will provide the necessary documentation.
- 9. Youth will do their own work appropriate for age and physical and mental development. This includes research and writing of exhibit explanations, preparing exhibits (such as sewing, cooking, refinishing, etc.), care and grooming of animals, etc. Adult assistance should help guide and support youth, not do it for them.
- 10. All exhibits will be a true representation of youth's work. Any attempt to take credit for other's work, alter the conformation of animals, or alter their performance is prohibited. Copyright violation or allowing others to complete youth's exhibit is considered misrepresentation and is prohibited.

ACCOMMODATING MEMBERS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

The Henry County Fair and ISU Henry County Extension program 4-H are available to all without regard to race, color, national origin, gender, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation, and martial or family status. 4-H members with disabilities needing special accommodations should contact the Henry County Extension office at least two weeks prior to the fair. A plan will be developed to meet the 4-H member's needs in cooperation with the member, parents, 4-H leader, volunteers, and Extension personnel.





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4-H & FFA SHOWS

PROTEST & APPEAL PROCEDURES

Any Iowa 4-H members and his/her/their parent or guardian, or participants entered in the same department can file a protest or appeal

PROTEST PROCEDURES

- 1. When a protest is made as to the eligibility of an animal or article to compete in any class or to an interpretation of a fair rule or violation of the Iowa Youth Code of Ethics, it must be filed with the appropriate committee chair or committee member will notify the 4-H Extension Office of the protest. It is important to include:
 - Names of persons involved and cause of protest or complaint
 - Specific action, rule, etc. in question
 - · Date and time of incident
 - Situation and documentation
 - Additional persons the committee may contact for further clarification
- 2. Any decisions regarding the protest shall be made with a quorum of committee members present and shall be in writing. The quorum shall consist of a majority of the members of the committee. No committee member shall be entitled to vote on a matter involving his/her family or a matter in which he/she has a conflict of interest. If an animal is involved in a dispute and a committee member has held prior ownership, that committee member shall refrain from voting. Any individual affected by the decision of a committee shall have the right to appeal pursuant to the protest procedures set out in paragraph 2.

APPEAL PROCEDURES

- When an appeal is made from the decision of a committee, it shall be made in writing and filed with the Henry County Fair Secretary within six hours of receipt of the original decision of the committee.
 - Names of person involved and cause of protest or complaint
 - Specific action, rule etc. in question
 - · Date and time of incident
 - · Situation and documentation
 - Additional persons the committee may contact for further clarification
 - Signature of 4-H member and their parent/guardian filing the appeal

Decision Unable To Be Protested/Appealed

- Decisions made by judges are final
- Issues related to deadlines for 4-H enrollment, livestock identification, and county/state fair entry deadlines.
- Code of Conduct-related violations

4-H & FFA SHOWS

SHOW OBJECTIVES, RULES & REGULATIONS & LIVESTOCK LIABILITY

OBJECTIVES OF THE SHOW

- To select for recognition those animals, articles or exhibits which best represent recommend standards
- To provide an opportunity for youth to measure their progress and skills against accepted standards
- To assist youth in their personal development and character growth in honesty, integrity, responsibility, creativity, citizenship and leadership skills
- To provide an opportunity for youth to gain personal satisfaction, met new people, share ideas and learn to work cooperatively with others.
- To stimulate interest and learn from the variety of projects that 4-H offers
- To provide a showcase for the accomplishments of our youth.

GENERAL RULE & REGULATIONS

- 1. All entries must be the work of active 4-H members, who have been enrolled in 4-H Online before May 15th of the current year.
- 2. Any exhibitor must have completed 4th grade or above and must not have graduated from high school before December of the current year to be eligible to exhibit at the fair.
- 3. Exhibitors must be enrolled in a Henry County 4-H club or a member of a Henry County FFA program.
- 4. Each exhibit must be the work of the exhibitor during the current 4-H year.
- 5. The exhibit must be an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of a project through 4-H
- 6. 4-H members are expected to wear a 4-H shirt (or a plain shirt with a 4-H emblem) when exhibiting in any department except Clothing and Communication Programs. No hats are to be worn!
- 7. Registration is required on exhibit building and livestock projects through fairentry.com by Friday, July 11th.
- 8. Members are expected to be present for conference judging. Parents and leaders are also welcome to hear comments. If a member is unable to be present for conference judging, they must contact the Henry County Extension office prior to judging day.
- 9. Grades listed below are those completed in the current school year.
 - Junior completed grades 4th, 5th, or 6th
 - Intermediate completed grade 7th, 8th, or 9th
 - Senior completed grades 10th, 11th, or 12th
- 10. Premiums will be issued ONLY to members showing non-market animals, no premiums are paid for ribbons of market animals. Any discrepancies need to be reported to the Henry County Extension office by August 15th.

STATEMENT OF REGULATIONS

We have tried to make all rules in this show simple, fair and correct. However, we realize that in making rules, misunderstandings are liable to come up. We, therefore, reserve the Project Department Committees that right to interpret rule where questions are raised. THEIR DECISION WILL BE FINAL

LIVESTOCK LIABILITY

The Henry County Fair Board, Henry County Extension, as sponsors of the fair livestock shows; owners and exhibitors of fair livestock entries, are not liable for the damages, injury or death suffered by a participant or spectator resulting for the inherent risk of fair animal activity. Only owners/exhibitors are responsible for removing livestock from fairgrounds for any reason. In the case of death or injury to a domesticated animal exhibited by a 4-H member, or open livestock exhibitor, the Henry County Fair Board, Henry County Extension office and department chair person/volunteer member are not to be held responsible.

POST FAIR CLEAN-UP

ALL 4-H CLUBS will be responsible for post fair clean-up this includes: disassembling show ring, gates panels, etc. Each club should have a minimum of three members and three adults. Clean-up will begin after each department is finished. Any youth who fail to clean up their pens will forfeit their premiums.

4-H BUILDING STATIC EXHIBIT

This department is open to youth who are participating in 4-H Youth Development Programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension. All exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with the Iowa State Fair 4-H General Exhibit Rules, 4-H General Rules and Regulations, and all 4-H department exhibit class rules and regulations.

GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. 4-H members who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2025 are eligible to exhibit at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Group exhibits from an entire club may include 4th grade members.
- 2. Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of the 4-H member's participation in 4-H projects or programs during the current 4-H year. Exhibits can be done by an individual or group and may represent all or part of the learning in the project or program.
- 3. Exhibitors in 4-H classes are not eligible to exhibit in a similar department of the FFA divisions or vice-versa. See also "4-H Department General Rules and Regulations".
- 4. Exhibits previously entered in an FFA Ag Science Fair or any other FFA event or competition may not be entered in any 4-H exhibit class.
- 5. Exhibits that do not comply with the class description, size guidelines, copyright restrictions, safety and approved methods will be disqualified and not put on public display.
- 6. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
 - Posters may not exceed 24" x 36" in size
 - Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc. may not exceed 48"x48"
 - Display boxes may not exceed 28" x 22" in height or width and 12" depth
- 7. Endangered and threatened plants and animals (includes insects), or songbird feathers and nests may NOT be used in any exhibit. Game animals legally taken are acceptable. Live specimens of noxious weeds or invasive species are NOT permitted in any exhibit. Dried specimens are acceptable to use in exhibits
- 8. Copyrighted materials and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials/designs used in exhibits. (See also special rules for Visual Arts and general copyright information for 4-H member)

- 9. The 4-H member's goal and applicable exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship and techniques, and general appearance and design. Exhibitors will receive written evaluation comments on the exhibits and a blue, red, or white exhibitor's ribbon. Refer to exhibit class evaluation rubrics for detailed evaluation criteria in each class. Rubrics are located at www.extension.iastate. edu/4h/
- A written explanation, audio recording, or video recording is to be included as part of each exhibit. The exhibitor should respond briefly to the following questions about the exhibit.
 - What did you plan to learn about?
 - What steps did you take to learn or do this?
 - What were the most important things you learned?
- Exhibits with a goal that better fits a different department/class will be moved to that department/class, at the discretion of the superintendent of the department.
- 12. All judges' decisions are final.
- 13. Each item in an exhibit must be securely labeled, including the name of the county, class number, and exhibitor's name.
- 14. No entry fee is required. The exhibit should be selected at a county event. All entries must be made in the name of the county and certified by an Extension staff member.

STATE FAIR INFORMATION

- The ISU Henry County Extension Office staff is not responsible for transporting items to the Iowa State Fair for Henry County 4-H exhibitors. It is encouraged for a 4-H parent of a state fair exhibitor to volunteer to take exhibits up for the county.
- All exhibits must reach the state 4-H exhibit building on August 5th or 6th exact date and time to be determined. Exceptions: Exhibitors participating in alternative evaluation/educational learning experiences will enter exhibits as determined for program participation.
- 3. All exhibits must remain until August 18th or 19th, exact date and time to be determined. Projects must be checked out with the department superintendents before being removed from the 4-H Exhibits Building. All persons picking up (one or more) exhibits must adhere to this schedule and county assigned time.
- 4. Due to security, 4-H members are discouraged from sending items that have special meaning and historical value as the exhibit or part of an exhibit.
- The Iowa State Fair and Iowa State University Extension & Outreach will use diligence to insure the safety of articles entered for exhibition after arrival and placement. However, they will not be responsible for damage or loss by accident, fire, theft, etc.
- 6. The Iowa State Fair Management will in no case assume or pay transportation or delivery charges on articles sent for exhibition.
- Counties will be awarded a pro-rate amount of travel money based on participation and distance from Des Moines instead of exhibit premium money. Distance determination will be based on the established zones as determined by the Iowa State Fair.
- 8. Henry County State Fair exhibitors will be contacted with complete details regarding exhibit drop off at the Extension Office the first week of August.

In accordance with Federal law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, Iowa State University is prohibited from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, and reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity. 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CLASS DESCRIPTION

Most exhibit classes have specific guidelines and requirements that will be included in the judging process. Members are strongly encouraged go to www.extension. iastate.edu/4h/exhibit-tip-sheets for more information on judging criteria for exhibits that they create for their 4-H project learning.

ANIMALS

10110 ANIMAL SCIENCE - An exhibit (other than the animal itself) that shows learning about a large or small animal including beef, dairy cattle, dairy goats, dogs, horse & pony, meat goats, pets, poultry, rabbits, sheep and swine. Ownership of an animal is not required.

10120 VETERINARY SCIENCE - An exhibit that shows learning about keeping animals healthy, animal diseases, animal/human health interaction, or other learning related to Veterinary Science.

AGRICULTURE & NATURAL RESOURCES

10210 CROP PRODUCTION & PLANT SCIENCE - An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of field crops, plant growth; soils and soil fertility; or any other learning related to crop production and plant science.

10220 CONSERVATION, ENVIRONMENT, & SUSTAINABILITY - connections between humans and their environment including energy conservation, stewardship, conservation, creating habitat, etc.

10222 ENTOMOLOGY - An exhibit (excluding live specimens) that shows learning or is an outgrowth or an entomology or bee project experience. Includes specimen collections and may include products (ex: honey) or equipment as part of the display.

10224 FISH & WILDLIFE - An exhibit that shows learning about a fish and/or wildlife project or program such as identification, habitats, harvest, taxidermy, etc. Any specimens must have been legally taken and must include information about date and location of harvest, and who the specimen was acquired from if not self-harvested. Feral pigs (including Russian/European Boar) are NOT permitted in taxidermy exhibits.

10226 FORESTRY - An exhibit, including collections, that show learning from participation in a forestry project or program.

10230 HORTICULTURE & PLANT SCIENCE - An exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of plants, soils, small fruit production, vegetable and flower gardens, plant nutrition, careers, etc. (Garden crops and herbs are exhibited in classes in the 4-H Horticulture Department.)

10235 HOME GROUNDS IMPROVEMENT - An exhibit that shows learning about landscape plans, selection of landscape plants, ornamental garden features, home yard improvement, storage sheds, careers, etc.

10240 OUTDOOR ADVENTURES - An exhibit that shows learning about backpacking, biking, camping, canoing, fishing, hiking or other outdoor activities. **10250 SAFETY & EDUCATION IN SHOOTING SPORTS** - An exhibit that shows learning about safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment or wildlife management. (The exhibit may not include actual firearms; archery equipment allowed if tips are removed from arrows).

10260 OTHER AGRICULTURE & NATURAL RESOURCES - An exhibit that shows learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the classes listed above.

CREATIVE ARTS

10310 MUSIC - An exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition and arrangements, instruments, musical styles or history.

10320 PHOTOGRAPHY - An exhibit, either photo(s) or an educational display, that shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Still photos only, not video.

PHOTOGRAPHY SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Photographs may be either black and white or color. Photographs must have been taken since your county fair of the previous year.
- 2. Photographs should be a minimum of 5" x 7". Finished size (including mounting/matting) of single photographs should not exceed 11" x 14". Exception: Panoramic photos must not exceed 24" in length.
- All photographs must be printed on photographic paper and must be mounted and/or matted. Maximum thickness of finished project must not exceed 1/4" thick.
- 4. Mounted photos can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board, or (b) with mount borders [window mat or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats or have matting done professionally.
 - 4-H members are responsible for design decisions such as mounting, matting, color and size
 - Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be judged.
- 5. A series is a group of photographs or slides [3 to 5] that are related or tell a stepby-step story. Photographs must be mounted together in story order or sequence. Finished size of individual photographs in a series should not exceed 6"x 8".
- 6. Edited photos should include a copy of the photo before edits.
- 7. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
- 8. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.
- 9. Iowa State Fair 4-H photography exhibitors must use the Photo Exhibit

10340 CREATIVE PHOTOGRAPHY - A photographic image that was creatively edited or modified beyond reality in a creative, imaginative and experimental way to make it more interesting and visually engaging. Could be a composite of multiple overlapped photographs.

CREATIVE PHOTOGRAPHY SPECIAL RULES

- Photograph/image may be mounted/matted or submitted (uploaded) as a digital image.
- 2. If mounted, photograph/image must be mounted on foam core no smaller than 5" in length or larger than 14" in length.
- 3. Photograph/Image can be digitally created or from film negative.
- 4. Exhibit must have the most current Photo Exhibit Label on back with required information for photo exhibits. Exhibit write up should include additional information about the processes and decisions used to develop exhibit.
- 5. Subject matter must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting, photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.

10345 PHOTOGRAPHY IDEA/EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY - An exhibit that demonstrates learning about photography that does not fit into any previous photography class. This class may include educational displays about printing, processing, editing, marketing, branding, merchandising, etc. as it relates to photography.

10540 DIGITAL STORYTELLING - An exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative movie/film/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video.

10350 VISUAL ARTS - ORIGINAL ART - An exhibit that shows learning through creation of original art. Original art is a one of a kind, non-replicate design of your creation. By using one medium or a combination, an individual creates an authentic work of art that is not recognizable as another's work. You must explain the application of the most relevant design element(s) an dart principle(s) featured in this exhibit. Describe your inspirations, reasons, feelings, and/or motives for creating this work of art.

10355 VISUAL ARTS - DESIGN, PROCESS OR TECHNIQUE EXPLORATION - This class emphasizes process and provides an individual the opportunity to explore a medium, practice a skill, or study and apply elements and principles of art and design. An explanation of the application of design elements or art principles used when making the exhibit must be included. This exhibit may be an object, portfolio, display, poster, or organized sketchbook. If a non-original design source is used, its origin (where the idea was found, any pictures, sketches, etc.) must be credited, acknowledged or have copyright permission obtained. See visual arts special rule #5 & #6.

10360 VISUAL ARTS - OTHER VISUAL ART IDEAS/TOPICS - Exhibits might include the study and research about an individual artist, style, craft, business or marketing process, planning a group tour, career options, etc.

VISUAL ARTS SPECIAL RULES

- Items entered for the Iowa State Fair must be ready for display in the home, gallery or intended final display location: pictured framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang etc. Make sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command strips or other quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items nor ready for display will be dropped one ribbon placing.
- 2. Exhibits made from kits or preformed mold will not be accepted. Exceptions: Preformed molds(green ware, white ware) may be used to provide appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design
- 3. If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source or inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included.
- If the exhibit is a finished art object information must be included explaining the application of design elements and art principles used in creation of the work
- 5. Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist, or represent a significant modification to an existing design to make a new and original statement by the artist.

6. Exhibition of derivative works created by a 4-H member is prohibited without the written permission of the original copyright holder/owner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos or materials in 4-H visual arts exhibits is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holder/owner.

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FAMILY & CONSUMER SCIENCE

10410 CHILD DEVELOPMENT - An exhibit that shows learning about children. Exhibits that include items intended for use with children (books, toys, learning games, babysitting kits, etc.) should include information about what you have learned 1) about children while creating and using the exhibit or 2) what the child(ren) learned from use of the item(s) in the exhibit. Exhibit examples include careers in child development, caring for children with special needs, childcare, growth and development, safety and health, etc.

10420 CLOTHING & FASHION - CONSTRUCTED/SEWN GARMENTS &

ACCESSORIES - A constructed garment or accessory (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and/or clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

10422 CLOTHING & FASHION - PURCHASED GARMENTS & ACCESSORIES -

Purchased garments or accessories that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and/or clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

10424 CLOTHING & FASHION - OTHER IDEAS/EDUCATIONAL EXHIBITS - Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about clothing and fashion including but not limited to design illustrations, exploration of clothing styles, careers, clothing care, etc.

CLOTHING & FASHION SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as a 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.
- 2. Exhibits in classes 10420 and 10422 must include information about application of design elements and art principles. Exhibits in class 10424 should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.



10430 CONSUMER MANAGEMENT - An exhibit that shows learning through savvy budgeting, comparison shopping, money management, or consumer rights and responsibilities.

10440 FOOD & NUTRITION - PREPARED PRODUCT - An exhibit of a prepared food product that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, or safety practices through the making of a prepared food product. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide" at https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434 for additional information regarding prepared food products. *Display boxes are not allowed for prepared products at the Iowa State Fair.*

10442 FOOD & NUTRITION - PRESERVED PRODUCT - An exhibit of a preserved food product that shows skills or learning about food preservation through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. Processed honey may be exhibited in this class. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs - Quick Reference Guide" at https://store.extension.iastate.edu/product/6434 for additional information regarding preserved food products 10445 FOOD & NUTRITION - EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY - An educational exhibit (poster, report, display) that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, meal planning/preparation & service, safety practices, or food preservation. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs - Quick Reference Guide" for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products. Exhibits showing learning about meal planning & service must include a menu.

FOOD & NUTRITION SPECIAL RULES

- Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- 2. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.
- Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers.
- 4. Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- 5. Meat jerky products are prohibited.
- 6. The recipe must be included for any prepared or preserved food exhibit; credit the source of the recipe.
- Preserved foods must include the Food Preservation Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2022 is acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used. Processed honey must include the Honey Exhibit Label.
- 8. Preserved food exhibits must include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display.
- Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard.
 Place food product exhibit in a re-closable plastic bag with entry tag fastened outside the bag. Recommended number of items to include with the exhibit:
 - Cookies, cupcakes, bars, muffins, rolls etc. 4-6 items.
 - Cakes, loafs, pies, etc. 1 whole product.
- 10. The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted

10450 HEALTH - An exhibit that shows learning through food choices, safe activities, skills such as first aid and CPR, careers, and/or healthy lifestyle choices.

10460 HOME IMPROVEMENT - An exhibit that shows learning in planning, improving and caring for your home living space, including extended personal living areas immediately adjacent to the home. Exhibits may include new or refinished/reclaimed/restored items. Exhibits showing learning about home design, furniture, home accessories, and fabrics must include information about how design elements and art principles were applied.

HOME IMPROVEMENT SPECIAL RULES

- Items entered for exhibition at the Iowa State Fair must be ready for display in
 the home: pictures framed, wall hangings and pictures ready to hang, etc. Make
 sure hangers are strong enough to support the item. Command Strips or other
 quick attach products are usually not adequate hangers. Items not ready for
 display will be dropped on ribbon placing.
- 2. Exhibit write-up/information must include source of inspiration and/or references indicating where the idea or information was obtained, giving credit to original author(s), designer(s), artist(s).

10470 SEWING & NEEDLE ARTS - A constructed item(sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning and kill in sewing, knitting, crocheting, or other needle arts. May include the construction of household items such as pillowcases, curtains, table runners, quilts, wall hangings, etc. Exhibits in this class are not intended to be worn by humans.

10472 SEWING & NEEDLE ARTS - OTHER IDEAS/EDUCATIONAL EXHIBITS- Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about sewing and needle arts including construction techniques, use and care of fabrics and fibers, design illustrations, decorative processes, careers, etc. *Note: Exhibits in classes 10470 and 10472 should include information about application of design elements and art principles if appropriate for the exhibit.*

10480 OTHER FAMILY & CONSUMER SCIENCE - An exhibit that demonstrates learning about a family and consumer science topic that does not fit any other Family & Consumer Science class listed.



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SPECIAL EXHIBITION-THRIFTY MEAL CHALLENGE

10490 THRIFTY MEAL CHALLENGE - Create a balanced, nutritious meal for family of four (4) that includes a serving from each of the five good groups with a budget of \$11.

THRIFTY MEAL CHALLENGE SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Each county may enter one (1) exhibit in this class.
- 2. All entries will receive an evaluation and participation ribbon.
- 3. Exhibit may be from an individual or group effort.
- 4. The meal must include a serving for each person from each of the five (5) food groups.
 - Recommended portion sizes per person: 1/2 cup fruit, 1/2 cup vegetables, 3 ounces protein, 1-2ounces grain, 1 cup equivalent dairy
- 5. The meal must serve 4 people
- 6. Total expense must not exceed \$11
- 7. The exhibit will be a poster (max size 20" x 30") that includes:
 - Menu
 - · Meal Type
 - Copy of receipts (up to 2)
 - Photos of participants experience
 - · Thrifty Meal Challenge worksheet (required)



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PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

10510 CITIZENSHIP & CIVIC ENGAGEMENT - An exhibit that shows learning about or contributing to your community, your country or your world.

10520 COMMUNICATION - An exhibit that shows learning about written, oral, and visual communication skills. Includes learning from participation in Theatre Arts projects or programs such as puppets, state design, etc. May include original creative writing, poetry, fiction, non-fiction, etc.

10530 4-H POSTER COMMUNICATION EXHIBIT - Special poster exhibit to visually tell a story or idea about 4-H to the general public. Exhibitors must use one of the following themes:

- 4-H is... (open to 4-H members interpretation)
- Join 4-H
- Beyond Ready In 4-H (2024 National 4-H Week theme)
- Lasso Your Legacy (2025 Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme)
- 4-H Sweet 4-H (variation of Iowa State Fair theme)

POSTER COMMUNICATION SPECIAL RULES

- Only one poster per 4-H members may be entered. Limit of two posters per county.
- 2. All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board or foam core board—size minimum of 14" x 20" or maximum of 15" x 22".
- 3. Posters may be vertical or horizontal. Posters may be any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage, etc.
- 4. Posters <u>cannot</u> be 3-dimensional. Materials used to make the poster may not extend more than 1/8 inch above the poster or foam core board.
- 5. Each poster must have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to the back.
- 6. Posters <u>cannot</u> use copyrighted material or exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.
- 7. 4-H members may include the 4-H clover in the poster.
- 8. All 4-H Communication Posters will receive Certificates of Recognition and written evaluation comments. Outstanding posters will receive Seals of Merit. Superior posters will receive Seals of Excellence.

10540 DIGITAL STORYTELLING - An exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce a creative movie/film/video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video.

10550 LEADERSHIP - An exhibit that shows learning about leadership skills and influencing others in a positive way.

10560 SELF-DETERMINED - An exhibit that shows learning as part of your 4-H adventure and does not fit any other class.

SCIENCE, ENGINEERING & TECHNOLOGY

10610 MECHANICS - An exhibit that shows skills or learning about general mechanics or engineering solutions or that involve a combination of skills.

10612 AUTOMOTIVE - Repaired or restored vehicle or educational display showing learning about an automotive idea including automotive maintenance, auto operations, auto safety, or automotive systems. (Note: vehicles will be on display at the Iowa State Fair one day only, Thursday August 10.)

10613 AUTOMOTIVE EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY - Educational display showing learning about an automotive idea including automotive maintenance, auto operations, auto safety, or automotive systems.

10614 ELECTRIC - Constructed or repaired article or educational display that shows skills or learning about electric wiring, appliances, lighting, electrical energy sources, safety, etc.

10615 SMALL ENGINE - Repaired or restored operating engine or educational display or other type exhibit that shows skills or learning about small engines. This class includes repaired or restored lawn tractors, small motorcycles, go-karts, etc.

10616 TRACTOR - Repaired or restored tractor. Note: A conference judging opportunity for exhibitors or repaired or restored tractors in class 10616 will be offered during exhibit check-in. (Conference judging may not be available during all check-in times.) Tractors will be displayed outside throughout the Iowa State Fair. Release time Sunday, August 20, after 7:00 p.m.

10617 TRACTOR EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY - Educational display showing learning related to tractors, tractor mechanics, tractor operations, or tractor safety.

 ${\bf 10618~WELDING}$ - Constructed item or educational display that shows skills or learning about welding.

10620 WOODWORKING - An exhibit that shows learning about wood, woodworking techniques, and safe uses of woodworking tools and machines. Exhibits may include newly constructed or refinished/reclaimed/restored wood items.

10630 SCIENCE, ENGINEERING & TECHNOLOGY - An exhibit that shows learning about or helps explain how science and technology help us interact with the world. Topics include, biological and chemical sciences, computers & networking, earth & climate, geospatial mapping (GPS/GIS), or any other application of Science, Engineering, or Technology.

10632 AEROSPACE - Educational display or other exhibit (including flyable models) showing learning about an aerospace idea or topic.

10634 ROBOTICS - Educational display or other exhibit (including working robots) that shows learning about robotics and robotic systems.

SCIENCE, ENGINEERING & TECHNOLOGY RULES

1. Exhibitors entered in the 4-H Science, Engineering & Technology classes are not eligible to exhibit similar FFA Ag Mechanics classes and vice-versa.

This department is open to youth who are participating in the 4-H Youth Development programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach. All participants are responsible for reading and complying with the Iowa State Fair Communication Even program rules, 4-H General Rules and Regulations, and specific class rules and regulations.

Purpose: The Communication Event Program provides opportunities for 4-H youth to develop their personal communication skills by sharing talents, knowledge, or information with others. The events provide a series of developmental experiences for different age levels.

Counties may enter up to the assigned quota for Educational Presentations (6), Working Exhibits (4), Share-The-Fun (3), and Extemporaneous Speaking (2). No more than two performances from an individual county will be scheduled during a Share-The-Fun show. Limit of two Communications Posters per county.

GENERAL COMMUNICATION EVENT PROGRAM RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. Judging for Educational Presentations and Extemporaneous Speaking will be on Friday, June 27, beginning at 9:00 a.m. at the Henry County Extension Office.
- 2. Judging for Working Exhibits will be Friday, July 18, beginning at 4:00 p.m. in the Exhibit Building at the fairgrounds.
- 3. Judging for Share the Fun will be held at 5:00p.m. on Friday, July 18th. Results will be announced at the end of each division.
- 4. Members are responsible for all of their own props including musical instruments.
- 5. 4-H members who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2025 are eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Share-The-Fun and Extemporaneous Speaking See class rules for age guidelines.
- 6. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibit may be given by one or more 4-H members. Teams consisting of youth of mixed grades will be entered in the class of the member in the highest grade level (i.e. a team with a 5th grader and an 8th grader must be entered in the intermediate/senior class).
- 7. Topics selected by the 4-H member(s) should be an outgrowth of their 4-H experience(s). Topics should be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.

- 8. Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking participants cannot be involved in another event (communication event, clothing programs, livestock show or judging) during the half-day they are scheduled to participate in their communication event. Share-The-Fun participants cannot be involved in another event from 30 minutes prior to the beginning of the scheduled show to 15 minutes following the show. Participation in multiple activities may not always be possible because of schedule conflicts.
- 9. Only presenters are allowed in the Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking preparation rooms.
- 10. Educational Presentation and Working Exhibit participants will be involved in a "peer evaluation program".
- 11. Educational Presentation and Working Exhibit participants will be involved in a "peer evaluation program".
- 12. All 4-H Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking participants will receive Certificates of Recognition and written evaluation comments. Seals of Merit will be presented to those giving outstanding presentations. Seals of Excellence will be presented to those giving superior presentations. Share-The-Fun participants will receive participation ribbons and a written critique of their performance. Participants are expected to be present for awards given at the close of their event session.
- 13. Participants in the 4-H Communication Programs are expected to wear appropriate clothing representative of the 4-H Youth Program and/or the topic of the presentation.
- 14. 4-H members must use sanitary and safe procedures and methods at all times. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits involving food must follow established food safety guidelines.
- 15. All participants are expected to comply with all copyright/trademark regulations. Copyrighted material may not be distributed without permission.
- 16. A \$12.00 fee per entry will be billed to the county. Entries should be selected from a county communication event program.
- 17. Allocated premiums will be paid to counties for distribution based on the participation in the 4-H Educational Presentation, Working Exhibit, and Extemporaneous Speaking opportunities. There will be no premium allocations for Share-The-Fun.



11100 EDUCATIONAL PRESENTATION - Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience


EDUCATIONAL PRESENTATION RULES & REGULATIONS

- Time limit: Junior presentations (5th & 6th grade) must not exceed 15 minutes. Intermediate/Senior Presentations (7th-12th grade) must not exceed 20 minutes. Presenters will be verbally told to "STOP" when they exceed the time limit.
- 2. Participants must turn in a completed Educational Presentation Report form during event check-in.
- 3. 4-H members may participate in one Educational Presentation per year at the Iowa State Fair.
- 4. Presentation content must be the original work of the presenter(s). Extensive paraphrasing from other sources is prohibited. Use of brief quotations or excerpts from other work(s) is permitted provided the source is identified.
- 5. A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included.

11200 WORKING EXHIBIT - Provide an opportunity for 4-H members to communicate, interact with and teach an audience in an informal and experiential way.

WORKING EXHIBIT RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. Time limit: All participants/teams will be scheduled for a 30 minute period.
- 2. Participants must turn in a completed Working Exhibit Report form during event check-in.
- 3. 4-H members may participate in one Working Exhibit per year at the Iowa State Fair.
- 4. Presentation content must be the original work of the presenter(s). Extensive paraphrasing from other sources is prohibited. Use of brief quotations or excerpts from other work(s) is permitted provided the source is identified.
- 5. A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included.



11300 SHARE-THE-FUN PROGRAM - Provide the opportunity for 4-H members to share their skills and talents before an audience purely for the sake of enjoyment

SHARE-THE-FUN DEPARTMENT RULES & REGULATIONS

- 6. Eligibility: 4-H members who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2024. Exception: If the Share-The-Fun act involves a whole club, the following criteria must be applied to determine if the club can be entered in the Share-The-Fun Program at the Iowa State Fair:
 - At least 80 percent of the performing group must have completed 5th through 12th grade in 2025.
 - Clover Kids are not eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair.
- 7. Share-The-Fun performances must not exceed six (6) minutes in length.
- 8. Skits, songs, stunts, short one-act plays, dance, and other entertainment are acceptable. All performances must be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
- 9. All acts must turn in a completed 4-H Share-The-Fun Report form at event checkin to confirm stage setup, cue music, etc.
- 10. General judge's comments for the entire show will occur at the Iowa State Fair. No individual conference with the judge will occur.

11400 EXTEMPORANEOUS SPEAKING PROGRAM - Encourage the development of communication skills by providing an opportunity to think, organize thoughts, prepare a speech and respond with questions when given a limited amount of preparation time.

EXTEMPORANEOUS SPEAKING RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. Participants must be senior 4-Hers completed 9th through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2025.
- 2. Each county may enter a maximum of two entries; individuals may participate once per year at the Iowa State Fair.
- 3. Program format:
 - a. 30 minutes before the program, each participant will draw 3 of the available topics, selecting on to speak on.
 - The selected topic will not be available to the other participants in the speaker's assigned room. The general nature of the topics will relate to 4-H.
 The other two topics drawn but not chosen will be returned to the available topics for other participants.
 - b. A preparation room is to be used with one participant per speaking site admitted initially and one additional participant per speaking site admitted each 15 minutes as the program progresses. A participant may not leave the preparation room until it is time to speak, nor may a participant receive help from a parent, leader or other adult or youth. A program official will assist participants with the time requirements.
 - All reference materials will be screened by a program official on the following basis:
 - Participants may bring their own books, magazines, or newspaper clippings for reference during the 30 minute preparation time
 - Reference materials must be printed material such as book, magazines, etc. cannot include notes, outlines, or speeches, prepared by the participant or another person.

- Some relevant reference material will be available in the preparation room. This material will consist of historic materials related to the 4-H program.
- d. Each speech shall be result of the 4-H members own efforts using approved reference material that a participant may bring to the preparation room. No other assistance may be provided. Plain not cards will be provided for each participant in the preparation room. If notes are used, the note cards provided must be used in delivering the speech.
- e. Only notes made during the preparation period may be used.
- f. Each speech shall be not less than 4 but no more than 6 minutes with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions, which shall be asked by the judge. The participant will be shown time cards in the ascending order (1, 2, 3, 4, 5) by the time keeper. "STOP" will be said at 6 minutes.
- g. The program timekeeper will introduce each participant by name, the county they represent, and read the selected question.
- h. Participants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters, or audiovisuals of any sort. A podium will not be available.
- 4. Speeches will be evaluated using the following criteria:
 - Content related to topic.
 - Knowledge of the subject.
 - Organization of material.
 - Power of expression.
 - Voice.
 - Stage presence.
 - General effect.
 - Response to questions.
- 5. A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included.

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
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CLOTHING PROGRAM: REVENUE & SELECTION

Tuesday, July 15th

Committee: Arin Jones & Ava Lowery

- 1. Judging will be on June 27th beginning at 9:00 a.m. at the Henry County Extension Office. The public clothing program will be July 16th during the Henry County Fair Queen Contest at 7:30 p.m. located in the Wright Pavilion.
- 2. Each youth may only participate in the 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event with one entry per year. Participants may be selected to participate in any one of the four classes, even if they participated in that class in previous years.
- 3. Each county may send the following number of participants total with no more than two participants in each class to represent their county, selected from each of the county's events:
 - Fashion Revue Class: Four participants total with no more than two
 participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear,
 everyday wear, costume).
 - \$20 Challenge Class: Four participants total with no more than two participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - Clothing Selection Class: Four participants total with no more than two participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
 - Innovative Design Class: Four participants total with no more than two participants with an entry in any given category (athletic wear, formal wear, everyday wear, costume).
- 4. The categories in each class are simply for entry limit purposes. All entries in each class will be judged together.
- 5. Participants must be in the senior 4-H designated level (completed grades 9-12 the same year as the event).
- Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the State 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as another 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.
- 7. Participants must bring the garment or outfit they purchased or created, and accessories, to the State 4-H Awardrobe Clothing Event.



- 8. Participants should submit only the materials requested for each class (report form and photo for ALL classes plus a receipt for \$20 challenge). If additional materials are sent with the entry or brought to the conference judging, they will not be considered.
- 9. Participant report forms must be uploaded by county staff no later than July 31. Participants should abide by county deadlines for submitting paperwork for entry. Requests for class or group time changes will be honored as availability allows through July 31. Requests made after July 31 cannot be accommodated due to our printing deadlines.
- 10. A \$30 registration fee is required for each participant entry. Counties will be billed following the Iowa State Fair.
- 11. All participants must participate in all Awardrobe Clothing Event activities at the times scheduled for their county unless the 4-H member is involved in another Iowa State Fair 4-H activity at the same time with a non-flexible schedule. Pre-approval is required prior to July 31.

FASHION REVUE

- 1. The purpose of this category is to encourage the construction of a personal garment or outfit.
- 2. Consideration is given to fit, color, style, suitability, quality of construction, stage presentation, and required care.
- 3. Youth participants will model a garment or outfit they constructed, hand-knitted, machine-knitted, or crocheted during the current 4-H year.
- 4. A garment or outfit consists of one to three pieces such as, but not limited to, party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear and/or coats.
- 5. Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered as garments. If they are used to complete an outfit, they may be constructed or selected.
- 6. All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected.

CLOTHING SELECTION

- 1. The purpose of this category is to select and/or purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H member's goal or intended use for the selected outfit.
- 2. Judging is based on fit, color, style, suitability, quality and construction features, stage presentation, required care, and cost comparison.
- 3. There is no consideration in the judging on the amount spent, only in the process of record keeping and reflection on the cost of the individual items as a part of the process.
- 4. Outfits may be purchased at a department store, boutique, online store, sidewalk sales, retail shops or mall stores. Outfits may also be purchased at garage sales or other second hand venues at any price point. Outfits may be gifts, hand-me-downs, relative or friend's modern or vintage clothing, or existing personal clothing, as long as the 4-H member selected the item as part of this specific outfit for the stated purpose.
- 5. Home-sewn clothing that was not sewn specifically for the participant are acceptable, such as purchases from a used clothing store.

THE \$20 CHALLENGE

- This class is designed to expand the 4-H member's shopping experience to shopping venues emphasizing recycling, reducing and reusing. Outfits must be purchased at a garage sale, consignment store, thrift store, secondhand store, or similar place.
- 2. Online venues are allowed, must be second-hand in nature. Shipping and handling is not included in the total calculations.
- 3. Traditional shopping venues may not be used, regardless of a low regular or sale price. Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts do not qualify for this class.
- 4. Twenty dollars is the purchase price limit including tax. However, some second hand stores and venues do not typically charge sales tax.
- 5. Receipt(s) for every item included as a part of the calculated total must be submitted with the entry. A garage sale receipt can be a piece of paper with the name of the location such as "Jane Doe garage sale", date, amount paid, and signature of person selling at the garage sale. If the outfit was free at a garage sale, "free" can be listed on the report form and on the receipt. Failure to provide receipts will be reflected in the evaluation.
- An outfit consists of major clothing pieces such as a shirt and pants or a dress.
 Shoes, undergarments and accessories are not included in the \$20 purchase price limit.
- 7. Alterations are permitted to achieve a desired look or fit.
- 8. There are no additional considerations for an outfit that cost less than \$20.
- 9. The outfit pieces should be purchased to meet the 4-H member's goal or intended use for the purchased outfit, and the 4-Her should have had an experience in choosing shopping alternatives, evaluating fit, quality and construction features, price, and cost comparison.

INNOVATIVE DESIGN

- 1. The purpose of this class is to encourage creativity and out of the box thinking when creating an outfit.
- 2. These designs can be theatrical costumes, cos-play, wearable technology, sustainable/up cycled fashion, accessible fashion, and/or outfits that use unconventional materials.
- 3. The outfit must be showcased as a worn garment modeled by the exhibitor or by the individual that it was designed for.
- 4. Exhibitors may make their garment entirely, or permanently alter the silhouette of pre-existing materials through some method of permanent alteration or addition.
- 5. Consideration is give to originality and innovation.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

- All Awardrobe Clothing Event participants will receive a participation ribbon presented at the public fashion show held at the Iowa State Fair.
- The top five (5) entries in each class (Fashion Revue, Clothing Selection, \$20 Challenge, Innovative Design) will receive an award plaque.
- Special Recognition will be presented by the Central Iowa Chapter, American Sewing Guild to two individuals who exhibit outstanding sewing skills in the Fashion Revue class.

- One inspiring participant selected as one of the top five in the Innovative Design Class who has expressed an interest in furthering their education in fashion design, fashion merchandising, or interior design will be awarded a \$250 scholarship to Des Moines Area Community College's Fashion Institute.
- The Iowa State University Trend Magazine and founding advisor, Ann Thye will present an "On Trend Award" (\$50 gift card) to one participant whose garment incorporates this year's clothing trends.
- The DMACC Fashion Institute Style Award is (Style book and \$50 gift card)
 awarded to the participant who demonstrates excellence in styling their outfit.
- One inspiring participant (must have been selected as top five in class), and
 who has expressed an interest in furthering their education in textiles and
 clothing, hospitality management, or event management will be awarded a
 \$500 scholarship to the Iowa State University College of Human Sciences'
 Department of Apparel, Events, and Hospitality Management

- 3. Digitally altered photos should include a copy of the original before changes.
- 4. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.

The rule that photographs showing unsafe practices will not be displayed reflects current practice. This rule also aligns with the general rule that all exhibits must use safe and approved methods. Of special concern are photographs of railroads and rail tracks that could not have been taken without trespassing on railroad property. This is a major concern of railroads and one they seek to cause greater awareness of – for professional and amateur photographers alike. It's fine to take photos of trains and rails. Photographers need to do it in a safe manner and from public spaces, not railroad property. 

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
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2025 ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

FOR EXHIBITION OF LIVESTOCK, POULTRY & BIRDS AT COUNTY 4-H/FFA FAIR

ANY EVIDENCE OF WARTS, RINGWORM, FOOT ROT, PINK EYE, DRAINING ABSCESSES OR ANY OTHER CONTAGIOUS OR INFECTIOUS CONDITION WILL ELIMINATE THE ANIMAL FROM THE SHOW.

No individual Certificate of Veterinary Inspection will be required on animals or poultry exhibited at County 4-H/FFA fair, but the animals will be inspected when unloaded, or shortly thereafter, by an accredited veterinarian. Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited.

SWINE

No testing is required for swine at an exhibition that involves only market classes, provided all swine are consigned directly to a slaughter establishment from the exhibition. Families should plan on pigs going home.

POULTRY & BIRDS

All poultry exhibited must come from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean or equivalent flocks. All poultry and birds will Pullorum-Typhoid tested at check in.

DOGS

All dogs must have a current rabies vaccination certificate.

SHEEP & GOATS

All reproductively intact sheep and goats (ewes, does, rams, bucks) must have a scrapie tag before exhibition (at county or state fairs) or before being sold. This would include any ewe lambs shown in market classes also. 4-H and FFA members purchasing lambs at a few months of age need to be sure that the animals already have a scrapie flock tag in their ear when purchasing them from the birth flock, and all does have a tag or tattoo from the birth herd. Wether lambs and kids do not need to be tagged. Registered goats may use officially approved unique tattoo numbers. If you have a flock or herd, you will need to order scrapie program tags from USDA Animal & Plant Health Inspection Service, 1-866-873-2824. When you call they will assign you a flock premise number. They will also send record keeping forms along with your tags. Tags are available free of charge, but only in quantities of 100 or more.

HERDSMANSHIP

All livestock exhibitors are required to maintain their quarters as orderly as possible and must keep the part of the building they occupy neat and attractive. All clubs/chapters as well as individuals members will compete in the herdsmanship contest.

Responsibility - Herdsmanship duties are the responsibility of exhibitors rather than leaders, advisors or parents.

Judging - A committee will be chosen to judge herdsmanship. There will be a separate division for each livestock barn (beef, sheep/goat, swine, and poultry/rabbits). They will then be totaled for the overall winner.

Basis of Ratings - Herdsmanship judges will use the following scoring guide in judging herdsmanship:

- Animals: clean at all times with proper grooming, feeding, bedding and care apparent.
- Stalls/Pens: clean and neat; bedding clean and fresh; feed and feed pans and buckets clean and in place. Club signs should be appropriate for the exhibit.
- Tack and feed area: kept clean and neatly arranged.
- Alleys: exhibitor's share of alley area kept clean; kept free of equipment; dust kept under control with proper sweeping and/or sprinkling.
- Exhibitors: be friendly and knowledgeable about your project.
- Pre-fair clean-up and post fair clean-up participation.

Times of Judging - Herdsmanship will be checked daily for the duration of the fair except the day of the show.

HERDSMANSHIP CONTEST

All 4-H livestock clubs (Horse, Beef, Goat, Sheep, Swine, Dairy, Rabbit & Poultry) will be automatically entered in the Herdsmanship Contest. Judges will be volunteers. Superintendents of each area will help organize the contest.

Herdsmanship will be judged each day except on show day and will be divided by species: Beef, Bucket Calf, Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep and Swine.

LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT

GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES & REGULATION - OBJECTIVE OF THE SHOW

- All animals and poultry exhibits must meet the state health requirements for the exhibition of livestock, poultry and birds in Iowa as listed under Health Requirements in the Fair Book. Animals not passing health requirements will be sent home.
- 2. Each member is expected to exhibit his/her project. Excusing a member from personally exhibiting his/her own animal defeats one of the important objectives of 4-H work. If a member is injured or seriously ill at the time of the show, the member may submit an application for a substitute showman. The substitute showman must be a 4-H/FFA member eligible to exhibit and approved in advance of the show by the department committee. Only members of a Henry County 4-H or FFA Club are eligible to exhibit. Participation in work or school activities will not be considered. An exhibitor who has more than one animal in a class needs not obtain approval for another eligible showman to exhibit one of his/her animals. No one will be allowed in the show ring other than the exhibitors and those responsible for the conduct of the show. Exceptions will be decided by the department committee.
- 3. Exhibitors in 4-H project divisions may not exhibit FFA projects in the same division.
- 4. It is the intent that the exhibitor take responsibility for the care/grooming of his/her own animals. If assistance is needed, it should be aimed at helping the member learn new skills and be done by a family member and/or another 4-H/FFA member. This show is an educational event. It is designed to train members to properly fit their animals and to exhibit his/her animal without aid.
- 5. No unnatural means of providing an animal feed, water, or other fluids (i.e. stomach pump, IV) will be allowed.
- 6. Rabbits, Poultry & Bucket Calves will be released at 9:00a.m. Sunday, all other livestock will be released 7:00 a.m. Monday. Members removing projects early will forfeit premium money unless given special permission by the fair board.
- 7. The Agriculture Department Committees will make all decisions concerning the management and administration of the Agricultural Division of the 4-H/FFA Achievement Show. Any suggestions should be written and given to appropriate committee chairpersons. Other opportunities for suggestions include: grievance form, suggestion boxes (located in the Fair Board Office and Exhibit Building) and an evaluation form available after the fair.
- 8. The committee may send home any unruly or potentially dangerous animals. All animals are the liability of their owners. See liability portion of the Fair Book.
- 9. Exhibitors of livestock are responsible to clean up their stalls, pens and crates after the fair.
- 10. Exhibitors are responsible for the security of their own livestock. A couple of representatives from each club are encouraged to be around the livestock barns during daylight hours.

- 11. An animal must receive a blue ribbon to qualify for Champion or Reserve Champion awards.
- 12. 4-H/FFA members may win showmanship only one time per age category per department, except in the Horse Department. Members are required to have an entry as a project in a department to enter the showmanship class.
- 13. Members with tagged animals losing their tags must report the loss immediately to the Henry County Extension Office AND to the department chairperson. Animals must be re-tagged by a committee member. Members may only exhibit those animals reported on their livestock identification in 4-H Online (deadlines follow) or on official Henry County 4-H/FFA weigh-in and ear tagging forms. All livestock must be owned by exhibitors or in partnership with parent or legal guardian. (Exceptions: Horse, see rule #2 under Horse & Pony Department Rules & Regulations. Dog, see rule #9 under Dog Department Rules & Regulations).
- 14. Fair pre-registration is required through fairentry.com.
- 15. Members will wear a solid-color shirt with 4-H/FFA emblem while showing. No hats are to be worn.
- 16. Portable fans will be allowed in livestock buildings (except swine & poultry), however, the fair board has the right to remove any fan that appears to be unsafe. The use of butt fans is prohibited in all barns. For Beef and Dairy Cattle only overhead fans located in the front half of stalling area will be allowed.
- 17. NO automotive vehicles or trailers will be allowed to park within the livestock barn area. Trailers should be parked in the designated area only.
- 18. All animals will be stalled in designated areas. No trailer stalling period. If animals are found to be stalled in trailer they will be sent home.
- No tack will be allowed in the barns until all animals have been weighed/ checked in and are in place.

- 2. Entries must be taught to lead and shown with a collar or halter.
- 3. Showmanship will be according to grade division. Past winners may not show again in the same division (will not "bump up" to next division).



MEAT GOAT RULES & REGULATIONS

- Exhibitors may show a maximum of 4 market goats born on or after October 1, 2024.
- 2. Meat Goats in Class 23200 must be weighed and tagged at the county sheep/goat weigh in on Friday, May 2, 2025 and will be weighed at fair check in time.
- 3. Goats will be judged along meat goat characteristics.
- 4. Market Goats are automatically entered in the Rate of Gain contest and must have been weighed on Friday May 2, 2025. Any goat not having readable ear tag or a scrapie tag will not be eligible for Rate of Gain competition. Rate of Gain will be calculated on all goats in class 230, with the top ten goats receiving recognition during the market goat show. Entries must be does or wethers (castrated males), and will be split into weight classes at the fair. Goat scanning for carcass results will take place on Thursday. Please notify at entry time at the fair which goat is to be scanned. Scanning fee will be \$10 per head.
- 5. Does shown in the meat class may not be entered in any other class.
- Horns: Exhibitors will be required to have horns dis-budded, dehorned, or tipped blunt on market animals before arrival on the fairgrounds.
- Hair: All market animals must be uniformly clipped with 3/8 inch length of hair
 or less above the knee hock joints to include head excluding tail prior to arrival
 on grounds.

MARKET BEEF RULES & REGULATIONS

General and general livestock rules and regulations apply in this department.

- 1. All exhibitors are eligible to weigh-in 6 market animals. Youth are limited to exhibiting 3 market beef animals in the 4-H Market Beef classes.
- 2. Pre-registration is required through fairentry.com
- 3. No cable halters may be used in the show ring.
- 4. Market beef may enter the barn between 11:00a.m.-2:00p.m. Weigh-in order will be determined by the cattle committee. No reweighs allowed unless scale mechanical failure. Weight classes will be determined after all calves have been weighed. Market steers must weigh 900lbs and market heifers 850lbs or more to qualify to Market Beef classes. Animals weighing 849lbs or less will be shown as heavy feeder calves and will not be eligible to show for champion.
- 5. Market Beef entries must have been weighed in on Saturday, December 21, 2024. If there is conflict, written request is REQUIRED and due to the Henry County Extension office by December 1st. After the requirements are met, member may choose to attend an adjoining county's weigh-in.
- 6. Only those beef with a daily rate of gain of 2.3lbs for steers and 2.1lbs for market heifers or more are eligible for blue ribbons. Those that do not meet the Rate of Gain minimums will receive a red ribbon. Animals placed behind that animal will receive their respective ribbons: blue, red or purple.
- 7. Market animals will be in 2 divisions: Market Heifers and Market Steers. Respective champions will be awarded in each division, and Market Heifer champions will compete against Market Steers in the Top 5 Drive. The Top 5 Drive will consist of the Champion Market Heifer, Reserve Champion Market Heifer, Champion & Reserve light, medium and heavy weight Market Steers, along with the Champion and Reserve Champion Purebred Steers.
- 8. Purebred Market Beef: there must be three animals in a class to represent a breed, if there is not three of one specific breed then there will be an all other breeds class shown by weight. Champion and Reserve Champion of each breed and AOB will compete against each other for an overall Purebred Market Champion and overall Purebred Market Reserve Champion. The two overall winners will then compete in the Top 5 Final Drive. State Fair rules will apple for registration. Registration papers must be in exhibitor's name and to the Extension office by February 1. Association rules apple to being considered purebred. At the time of the entry in Fair Entry the 4-H member will designate whether their steer will show as purebred or commercial. This includes minis
- 9. The County-Raised Beef producer must reside in Henry County
- 10. All market beef must be double-tied
- 11. Once a calf is loose in the ring 3 times, that calf is automatically tied to the fence for as long as the animal is being shown.
- 12. All market beef must be dehorned

- Class adjustments may be made at the discretion of the department or beef committee.
- 14. Every Market Steer brought to the fair will be scanned. Scanning will be on Thursday of fair week at 3:00pm.
- 15. All Market Steers will be shown in the Market Steer Production Show and the 4-H Beef show. These shows will be held separately. If market animals are not shown in the production show the exhibitor is not allowed to participate in the blue ribbon auction.
- 16. The Market Steer Production Show will be no fit.
- 17. Steers will be brought in by the December weigh-in weights and will be placed according to scan data.
- 18. The top 10 will be placed in the ring at the end of weight divisions and the audience will be given a list with no tag number or member number. Winner will then be announced.
- 19. The value added per day on feed formula will be used to judge this class.



- 1. Exhibitors are limited to a total of 3 entries in the Beef Heifer and Cow classes. Cows must have been registered by a member as a yearling in 4-H Online.
- 2. Pre-registration is required through fairentry.com
- 3. No cable halters may be used in the show ring.
- 4. All heifers will be judged from the standpoint of future usefulness as a breeding cow.
- 5. Heifers show in there division cannot be shown in any Market Beef class and are not eligible for the Ribbon Auction.
- 6. A minimum of 3 animals will represent a breed class. Otherwise, the committee will determine classes. Appendix and Purebred Shorthorn will be shown together, as will Foundation and Purebred Simmental. May 15th entries will designate all breed classes. 4-H members must designate if showing purebred or commercial in Fair Entry by deadline.
- 7. Breeding Beef class champions will advance to a Top 5 Drive If the top 2 are County Raised the highest placing will automatically be the County Raised Champion. If the top 2 are not County Raised then a County Raised Class will be held with the representatives of each.
- 8. Purebred Beef must turn in copies of registration papers at the time of ID, May 15th. If registration papers are not turned in by May 15th, animals will be shown in commercial class. Registration papers must be in 4-H/FFA members name. All purebred animals must have a legible tattoo. No tattoo class will be added to those with unreadable tattoos. No tattoo class is ineligible to advance to Grand Champion. The includes minis. 4-H members must designate if showing purebred or commercial in Fair Entry by the deadline.
- 9. Breeding Beef may enter the barn between 7:00am. 4:00pm. Weigh-in order will be determined by the beef committee.
- 10. All breeding beef must be double tied.

GENERAL SHEEP RULES & REGULATIONS

General livestock rules and regulations apply in this department.

- 1. Sheep pens must be bedded with wood shavings and wired securely at all times.
- 2. Pre-registration is required through fairentry.com.
- 3. Breeding rams must be tied at all times.
- 4. 4-H member or family member MUST be present or represented during entry at County Fair weigh-in on Wednesday evening.
- 5. All lambs must be on a halter when not in the pen this includes to and from show ring.
- Lambs shown in market classes may not be shown in purebred or commercial ewe classes.
- 7. It is the intent that the 4-H/FFA member take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animals. If assistance is needed, it should be aimed at helping the member learn new skills and be done by a family member, leader, committee member, or other 4-H or FFA member.
- 8. Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership, and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception. Exhibitor and animal will be disqualified.
- There will be no beating, mishandling, or ice applied to the animal. Exhibitor and animal will be disqualified.
- 10. The committee shall have the right to interpret the rules for any questions raised. Their decision shall be final.
- 11. If a member has multiple animals in the final drive, member must show highest ranking animal and ask for a substitute showman for lower ranking animals.
- 12. There will be no coloring agent used on any lamb.
- 13. Show order will be purebred, bottle lamb, commercial, market lamb, showmanship (senior, intermediate, junior).
- 14. Showmanship will be according to grade division. Past winners may not show again in the same division (will not "bump up" to next division).
- 15. A grooming area will be established by the committee. Members will be notified of the area on entry day.
- 16. Premiums paid will be: Blue \$5.00 and Red \$2.00 for Breeding classes and bottle lambs.

REGISTERED PUREBRED RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. Exhibitors are limited to no more than 2 entries in each of the breeding classes.
- 2. All purebred sheep must be registered with ear tag numbers in place.

MARKET LAMB RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. Entries in the market lamb classes shall be born after January 1, 2025.
- 2. All market lambs must have been rough-sheared at fair entry (July), and final-sheared with ¼" maximum wool length for show day. Slick shearing is accepted. Lambs do not need to be sheared for May weigh in.
- 3. Market lambs will be divided into weight classes with not more than 12 lambs per class. Market lambs must weigh over 85 lbs. or more.
- 4. Lambs weighing less than 85 lbs. will be shown as individual feeder lambs and will not be eligible for champion.
- 5. Each exhibitor may show up to 4 lambs in the individual feeder or market lamb classes.
- 6. Natural colored any breed of sheep that has a blue or black tint to the skin and wool. The body must have at least 50% be a color of white excluding the face and legs. A few black or blue spots coloring of the wool, bit marks, fungus spots or scares with black or dark fiber area will NOT classify the lamb in this division.
- 7. All market lambs and commercial breeding ewe lambs must have been weighed-in and tagged in order to be eligible to show. Any lost tags should be reported to a committee chairperson AND the Extension Office as soon as possible. Lambs will be re-tagged.
- 8. Rate of gain will still be calculated, but there will no longer be a minimum rate of gain requirement for blue ribbon awards. Grand Champion individuals will still be selected from blue ribbon groups only.
- 9. The lightest lamb on weigh-in day in May supersedes any tie in the Rate of Gain Class.
- 10. Market lambs must have their tails docked. Wethers must have been castrated or clamped by weigh-in day (May). Rams may not be shown in market classes.
- 11. Lambs shown in market classes may not be shown in purebred or commercial ewe classes.
- 12. All lambs must have 4 feet on the floor in the show ring at all times. Lifting feet off the ground or placing on any support or altered ring surface is not acceptable. Lamb's fronts can be picked up to set them up, but they cannot be braced with the feet off the ground or on exhibitor's feet. Exhibitors will receive two warnings if they are lifting or slapping lambs. Third offense will result in automatics disqualification.
- 13. County-purchased and home-born champion lamb will be awarded. 4-H/FFA member may not show the same lamb in both classes, and may show only one lamb in each class. "County purchased" is a lamb purchased from a Henry County producer. "Home-born" is a lamb born on the exhibitor's home farm.
- 14. Classes will be split into light, medium and heavy weight divisions
- 15. Carcass scanning will be available and will take place on Thursday starting at 3:00p.m. Please indicate at Fair entry which lambs you will want scanned. Members must exhibit champion animal if member has multiple animals in the final drive

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

SWINE RULES & REGULATIONS

Hogs must be checked off trailer Wednesday, July 17th, 7:00 - 8:00am. General and general livestock rules and regulations apply to this department.

- 1. All participants must meet YQCA requirements.
- 2. A maximum of eight hogs may be weighed at spring weigh in. Tags inserted at the weigh-in must be present to qualify for weight division classes. Hogs losing ear tags may be entered in a "No-Tag" class, but are not eligible for further recognition. All barrows must have been castrated prior to the weigh-in.
- 3. Pre-registration is required through fairentry.com.
- 4. Each exhibitor may bring and show up to 4 different hogs as follows:
 - All swine will be released to go home at 7:00a.m. on Monday
 - Each exhibitor may show a maximum of 4 animals in any combination of market gilt, market barrow, or derby gilt/barrow class. If 4 hogs are brought to the fair at least 1 can be selected be exhibited in the derby gilt/barrow class and still exhibit in the market class. Market class will be split by ending weight. Derby classes will be split by weight at beginning of weigh-in.
 - Each exhibitor is encouraged to enter a gilt or barrow in the derby carcass contest. Carcass placings will be based on a formula established by the swine committee using Lean Gain on test formula.
- 5. No oil may be used on the swine. Animals which have been clipped either prior to the fair or while on the fairgrounds will be EXCUSED.
- 6. All swine entries should weigh a minimum of 220lbs
- 7. Classes will be determined by the committee.
- 8. No premiums paid for ribbons
- All exhibitors are eligible to participate in the ribbon auction if showing in the market classes.

HORSE & PONY RULES & REGULATIONS

General livestock rules and general rules and regulations apply in this department, with the exception of general livestock rule #10 and #11. "Rules and regulations for Equine Shows in Iowa" 4-H 511c govern all exhibits in this department. 4-H 511C can be viewed, ordered or downloaded here: http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/projects/horse

- 1. Entries in the classes are open to horses or ponies regularly enrolled as 4-H projects. No stallions may be on grounds at any 4-H event. The 4-H/FFA member must have taken a major role in the care of their horse. To exhibit in classes where the primary emphasis of evaluation is the skill level of the 4-H/FFA member, ownership is not required; however, the 4-H/FFA member must take an active role in the care of the animal. Horses entered in Showmanship at halter must be owned by the 4-H/FFA member or in partnership with a family member. Leased horses are allowed in all classes starting with Class 313 and at committee discretion.
- 2. ALL horse and pony projects MUST be on the grounds by 8:00a.m. on show day Sunday, July 13th. ALL horses will be given health inspection prior to the show by the fair's official veterinarian and must be disease-free to participate in the show. All horses will be released after the show. ALL MANURE NEEDS TO BE CLEANED UP BY EXHIBITORS NOT COMMITTEE MEMBERS. The committee reserves the right to have premiums withheld.
- 3. Exhibitors apparel- See "rules and regulations for Equine Shows in Iowa" 4-H 511c
 - Western page 22,58
 - English page 22,38-39
 - Timed Event page 121
- 4. All 4-H/FFA youth participating in any riding classes must wear American Society of Testing Materials (ASTM) and Safety Engineering Institute (SEI) approved headgear with chin strap and properly fitted harness while mounted and riding, including warm up. REMEMBER: In the interest of safety when you are mounted, safety helmets and boots are mandatory, and the horse must be properly tacked. This includes the warm-up area. Any dispute will result in disqualification from your classes.
- 5. Contestants shall act as young ladies and gentlemen at all times. Unnecessary roughness or discourtesy will dismiss the exhibitor from further competition for the entire show. Good sportsmanship shall prevail. Courtesy is mandatory. No abuse of horses will be tolerated. Each exhibit must keep their horse under control or excused from ring.
- 6. The trail class shall include at least six and not more than 10 of the obstacles as listed for this class in 4H-511-C. Entrants may also be asked to ride the ring at walk, trot and lope both ways of the ring on a reasonable loose rein without undue restraint. The judges shall have the right to ask additional work from any horse.

- 7. The classes in this department will be judged based on the scoring procedures listed in 4H-511-C "Rules & Regulations for 4-H Equine Shows in Iowa." Ages of horses or ponies shall be based upon January 1 of the current year. Ponies are classified as 56 inches or under, horses over 56 inches.
- 8. Each rider must keep their horse or pony under control or be excused from the ring.
- 9. Each exhibitor may exhibit only one entry per class. Exhibitors must declare the horse they will show for points to accumulate prior to start of show.
- 10. If entries warrant, classes may be split or combined accordingly.
- 11. In order to participate at the Henry County Fair Horse Show, participants must belong to a Henry County 4H/FFA Club.
- 12. All equine must be identified in 4-H online by May 15th. Maximum of 5 head can be identified; of those a max of 2 may be leased. Leased horses must have a completed lease form, 4-H 106C, uploaded into 4-H online. Halter/confirmation class horses must be owned; cannot be leased. Photos must be uploaded into 4-H online (required for State Fair animals).
- 13. Pre-registration is required through fairentry.com.
- 14. High point winners will be given awards as follows: Grand Champion/Reserve Junior Rider grades 4-8; Grand Champion/Reserve Senior Rider grade 9-12. Points will be tabulated using system posted at announcer's stand on show day.



GENERAL DOG RULES & REGULATIONS

- State law requires dogs to have a current rabies certificate to present the day of judging.
- 2. General and general livestock rules and regulations apply in this department.
- 3. Dogs should be on the grounds the day of judging only.
- 4. Dogs must be leashed and kept away from animals and tents.
- 5. All dogs are required to wear a choke collar.
- 6. No crossbred mix of dog-coyote, dog-wolf, etc. will be allowed to participate.
- 7. All dogs are expected to be clean and well-groomed.
- 8. Dogs will be released by the superintendent at the end of judging.
- 9. Female dogs in season may not participate in the show.
- 10. It is not required that the dog be owned by the 4-H/FFA member; however the member must take an active role in the care and training of the dog.
- Any dog that is deemed unsafe by the committee leaders and/or is not under control will be asked not to participate in obedience training and will not be allowed to show.
- 12. Premiums paid will be: Handling—Blue \$3.00 and Red \$2.00
- 13. Obedience—Blue \$6.00 and Red \$4.00

OBEDIENCE RULES

- 1. Dogs must be trained and shown by 4-H members enrolled in dog obedience training. Only dogs participating in a majority of the Henry County Obedience training meetings will be permitted to show in obedience classes.
- Dogs previously trained by another member (or members) of the family must be shown in the class above the one in which it had previously received a qualifying score.

OBEDIENCE CLASSES: DIVISION 301 CLASSES

30101 - Sub-Novice A: For members in first year of training.

30103 - Sub-Novice B: For members with two or more years of training whose dogs have scored under 170 points in prior years and for members who have previously made a qualifying score in sub novice, but are showing a dog that has never made a qualifying score.

30104 - Sub-Novice A: For members who made a qualifying score in sub-novice but have not made a qualifying score in novice

30105 - Sub-Novice B: For members who previously made a qualifying score in novice but are showing a dog that has never made a qualifying score in novice A and B exercises will include: heel and figure 8 on leash, heel off leash, stand for examination off leash, recall and finish off leash and long sit and long down. (3 min. of leash)

30106 - Graduate Novice: For 4-H members whose dogs previously qualified at the novice level. Dogs must do the novice exercises plus figure 8 off leash, drop on recall, and sit for 3 minutes and down for 5 minutes with handler out of sight.

HANDLING RULES

- 2. The handler grades are grade completed this past school year.



GENERAL POULTRY RULES & REGULATIONS

General and general livestock rule and regulations apply to this department

- 1. All poultry must be identified in 4-H Online by June 1st.
- Exhibitors are limited to not more than ten entries per member. Each entry per class must be a different breed. Pens will be provided. Members must supply feed and water pans.
- 3. Pre-registration is required through fairentry.com.
- 4. Entries are to be checked in on Wednesday starting at 5:00 p.m. Poultry must be removed on Sunday evening beginning at 3:00 p.m. and the cage area cleaned.
- 5. All poultry will need to be pullorum tested. Members must be present to assist in the testing.
- 6. Only Special Broilers can sell ribbons at auction.
- 7. Members are responsible for the care of their own animals during the fair and keeping their cages/pens clean. Entries will not be released at the end of fair until the exhibitor's pens are checked by the committee. Failure to check out may result in loss of premium.
- 8. Each member exhibiting rabbits and poultry must help set-up or tear-down or forfeit premium. Exhibitors will be mailed a list of expectations and procedures regarding the poultry building. At check in this same information will be available, and ALL exhibitors will be required to sign their name stating that they have read and understand the information.
- 9. Breeding Birds should be entered as cock, hen, cockerel, or pullet with these terms defined as: Cock-male chicken 1 year old or older; Hen-female chicken 1 year old or older: Cockerel-male chicken less than 1 year old; Pullet a young hen, especially one less than one year old. A pen consists of one male and two females, all old or all young (i.e. one cock and two hens or one cockerel and two pullets). An individual bird may also be shown in a pen.
- 10. Showmanship classes are open to all poultry exhibitors. Grade divisions (grade completed) are: Jr. grades 4, 5, & 6; Int. grades 7, 8, & 9; Sr. grades 10 and up. Members are not eligible to win the showmanship trophy more than once in each grade division, but are encouraged to enter for ribbon awards.
- 11. Premiums paid will be: Blue \$3.00 and Red \$2.00 for all poultry classes except Special Broiler and Special Turkey

GENERAL RABBIT RULES & REGULATIONS

General and general livestock rule and regulations apply to this department

- 1. All rabbits must be tattooed and identified in 4-H online by June 1st. Absolutely no late entries will be accepted. (Young rabbits from Doe & Litter are exempt. Rabbits from market classes are exempt from tattooing, but must be ID'd by June 1st.)
- 2. Pre-registration is required through fairentry.com.
- 3. Exhibitors are limited to ten entries, no more than three per class. Exhibitors may use a rabbit from a meat class as a junior entry in the Commercial Classes, as long as it is purebred. A single rabbit from Market Pen of Three may be shown as a Single Fryer.
- 4. Entries must be in their display cage and checked in by the committee on Wednesday at 4:30 p.m. All rabbits must be removed on Sunday, beginning at noon and the cage area cleaned.
- 5. Some class groups may be combined if number of entries is very low.
- 6. Entries will be placed in blue or red groups. There will be a Champion and Reserve Champion in each class division. There will be a Grand Champion, Best of Show and Reserve Grand Champion will be Best Opposite.
- 7. Rabbits will be judged on overall quality and uniformity. Crossbred Rabbits are only allowed in the meat classes. Purebred rabbits will be judged as to the rules of the Standard of Rabbit Perfection. Rabbits will be judged in groups by breed and divided with no more than 16 per class due to table space.
- 8. Exhibitors are responsible for the care of their own animals and the cleaning of their pens during and after the fair. Entries will not be released at the end of fair until the exhibitor's pens are checked by the committee. Failure to check out may result in loss of premium.
- 9. Showmanship will be broken into Jr., Int. and Sr., which can only be won one time. Members may not advance to older group level until they reach that grade level.
- Each member exhibiting rabbits and poultry must help either with set-up or teardown, or forfeit premium. Exhibitors will be notified prior to the fair as to their responsibility.
- 11. Premiums paid will be: Blue \$3.00 and Red \$2.00

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


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
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
